Working with the Greater Baltimore Cultural Alliance, the William G. Baker, Jr. Memorial Fund established the Baker Artist Awards in 2008 to support artists and promote Greater Baltimore as a strong creative community. The Baker Artists Awards confer \$90,000 in prizes annually on six area artists across each artistic discipline. Awardees receive showcase and exhibition opportunities at major Baltimore institutions and a feature on Marvland Public Television's Artworks. The awards are adjudicated from artists on the **Baker Artist** Portfolios website. ELIZABETH EVITTS **DICKINSON**, the 2023 Mary Sawyers Imboden Prize winner, is the first literary artist to win the prestigious prize. Embark on a poetic journey through time with the Chicory Revitalization Project. Delve into Baltimore's literary, poetic, and activist past, present, and future through the lens of Chicory, a Baltimore Black community poetry magazine published from 1966-1983 that's being revived today. A panel discussion with Baltimore poets across generations uses poetry to preserve Baltimore's culture and amplify its distinct voice, celebrating the living legacy of those voices. Poet, educator, editor, and lyricist, Baltimore's **MELVIN E. BROWN**, the longest-serving editor of *Chicory*, is a graduate of the Johns Hopkins Writing Seminars with two poetry collections, In the First Place and Blue Notes and Blessing Songs, **REJJIA CAMPHOR**, a transdisciplinary artist, educator, and organizer, teaches at Writers In Baltimore Schools and founded the environmental community project. Sister

Stream Catcher. National Slam Champion **SLANGSTON HUGHES** is the artistic director of DewMore Baltimore, former coach of the two-time world champion Baltimore City Youth Poetry Team, and founder/member of the winningest poetry slam team, Slammageddon. Poet and performing artist, **TAYE CALDWELL**, a Patterson High School freshman, is a 2023 Baltimore Youth Poet Laureate Competition finalist. **PATRICE HUTTON**, founder of Writers in Baltimore Schools, and **A'NIYA TAYLOR**, Baltimore Youth Poet Laureate, 2022-2023, join the discussion. Whiting Fellow and founder of the Chicory Revitalization Project **MARY RIZZO**, will moderate.

For many Palestinian American poets, memoirists, and novelists, writing is a turbulent process met with obstacles, including censorship and a publishing industry that often seems closed to their voices. Six award-winning Palestinian American writers discuss their experiences: What issues do they confront when writing for a largely non-Palestinian audience? How do they articulate their identity in times of devastation? What role does literature play when Palestinian voices are threatened with erasure in unimaginable times? They discuss how words are forms of remembrance and support through unrest and sorrow. After a day of robust discussions, poet, educator, producer, and #1 New York Times bestselling author **KWAME ALEXANDER** joins us as a special guest in a celebratory finale. Expect poetry readings by This IS the Honey anthology contributors. CHET'LA SEBREE. KIMBERLY A. COLLINS, and MARITZA RIVERA before Kwame takes the stage and shares his own. Called a breathtaking poetry collection on "hope, heart, and heritage," Honey celebrates Black life in tender meditations and haunting lyricism. The series was produced in partnership with LeBron James' SpringHill Company and Big Sea Entertainment, Kwame's production company dedicated to creating innovative, highly original children's and family entertainment. He speaks on reinvention and navigating success with Baltimore's NYT bestselling, success story **D. WATKINS**. When the novel launched, Ron Charles (Washington Post) wrote, "A month ago, I'd never heard of Mateo Askaripour, Today I would buy anything from him." Many writers become discouraged at the prospect of submitting manuscripts while aging. While some publishers/agents think you have to be in your twenties to debut as an under-35 writer to gain an audience, these authors are here to tell you differently. How many stories do you have within you if you're riding 70? We're pushing back on that theory, as baby boomers start to reclaim themselves after their first retirement. We want to ensure that writers **Not. Give.
